Guest Lecture by Professor Gopal Guru

The Discipline of History, D. D. Kosambi School of Social Sciences and Behavioural Studies, organised a guest lecture on "What Counts a Quality Research?" by Professor Gopal Guru (Former Professor Centre for Political Studies, JNU and Former Editor, *Economic and Political Weekly*), on 08 October 2025 at 2.45 p.m. in the Seminar Hall, Faculty Block B.

The session began with a formal welcome by Professor Nagendra Rao, Dean, D. D. Kosambi School of Social Sciences and Behavioural Studies. Dr. Parag D. Parobo, Associate Professor of History and coordinator of the guest lecture, introduced Prof. Guru.

Prof. Guru began his lively session by examining questions on quality and how they arise when researchers engage in research. He emphasised that when the research faces existential problems, the quality question may appear redundant. Yet, we need to think of quality research because society's questions require our scholarly attention. We also need to think about research that is not quick but high-quality. The importance of doing research lies in our existential need rather than the need posed from above. Some scholars from metropolitan thinking continue to hold the view, or rather talk down from above, that we should broaden our thinking horizon from region to metropolitan thinking.

Research also involves ethical dimensions—people don't refer when the methodological conventions demand it. On the other hand, some scholars have become the intellectual password without which one cannot open one's own file—brand scholar, as it were. Similarly, the self-referential mode also becomes a problem. Avoiding all these practices poses a challenge to conducting frontline research with new insights, and not more of the same.

Prof. Guru highlighted the complexities involved in who can validate or accredit the quality of research. There are government institutions that can accredit the quality, and they do try to ensure the quality of research; however, it may not succeed all the time. According to Prof. Guru, the peer in the discipline is another's platform that can ensure the quality. However, the

members of the group should be objective in assessing the research work of their colleagues—no courtesy exchange. The members should have time for such work. Commitment is more for the enrichment of discipline, and this would personally help the researchers. Sharing research is essential for ensuring quality.

Through insightful examples and jolly anecdotes, Prof. Guru reflected on how to raise a research question. Which question is worthy of insightful research? The new question can emerge from two sources. There could be five critical sources that could help researchers raise questions. Firstly, a review of the literature. How does it help you raise new questions rather than sequential and descriptive questions? What are the sequential questions? They occur in the same context and same nature, while the descriptive questions are similar in different contexts or different questions in a similar context. Districts and villages remain the same, and questions do not explain the reality. Secondly, the research question can emerge from the view from nowhere. That which is not covered and is excluded from imagination. Questions that are unthought. The idea of space would change the nature of the question. Why do we find the gap and fill it with insights? The cause to do research is given in the gap, providing a compelling reason.

The questions are raised in the mind and sources of a question are:

- 1. Those who are rational beings are confronted with doubts. It is the confrontation with doubt that raises a question.
- 2. In the mathematical model, logic can form the basis of a question. The questions are a priori and necessarily abstract.
- 3. Social science questions are empirical and rooted in experience and material conditions.
- 4. In the humanities, questions may emerge out of curiosity. However, not curiosity but causality provides the need for research. There is a need for knowledge, and we must be open to experience.
- 5. Is it curiosity that leads to research? Or the patterns of domination and perpetuation of experience that should lead to a question.

Prof. Guru also highlighted the role of language in helping to articulate questions. Expressing to become universal requires a standard language. Private language would not do. We require translations in the common languages. Our research became intelligible within the framework

of a language. Language is the boundary of our research. The particular research is already universal.

The lecture was attended by 72 participants (postgraduate students, doctoral research scholars, and faculty members) from the disciplines of History, Sociology, Political Science, Women's Studies, Social Work, Philosophy, Public Administration, Law, Konkani, and English. The session ended with a vote of thanks by Mr. Vinod Kankonkar, Programme Director and Assistant Professor of History.
